MSSRF applies science and technology to address problems faced by rural populations creating change in their lives in the spheres of natural resource management, agriculture, food and nutrition. In working towards this, MSSRF has worked closely in partnership with communities, knowledge-based institutions, besides public and private sector organizations.

The Foundation influence spreads across Government, Educational Institutions and Researchers across 18 Countries, National, Bilateral and International Organizations bringing several Institutional Awards including the Blue Planet Prize, Stockholm Challenge Award, Equator Initiative Award, Water for Earth Award, mbillionth Award, National Water Award and several other prestigious awards.

Registered in 1988 as a non-profit Trust, MSSRF is recognised in India for Income Tax exemptions and to receive funds from sources abroad. Guided by a Board of Tustees, comprising eminent experts and professionals, MSSRF has been supported by many National and International Governments and Organisations through the years.

From the beginning, MSSRF has focused on participatory research with farming and fishing families and policy research for synergy between grassroot experience and public policy. Mahatma Gandhi's advice that "Windows and doors should be open to fresh ideas while the feet should be firmly on the ground", has guided the institution's philosophy.

MSSRF has worked jointly and in the lead on various international partnerships such as the Alleviating Poverty and Malnutrition project, the LANSA consortium, Rice Biopark, Afghan Scientists training and Genetic Garden, Clima-Adapt, Community Biodiversity Management, Promotion of Underutilized Crops and Mangrove Research and Capacity Building.

The Foundation continues in its path - towards becoming a global leader in humanistic science and scientific humanism.





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
